Over-Reliance on Databases

Western Assumption	Asia Reality	Potential Result
Centralized databases provide reliable coverage	Data is often fragmented or restricted	Incomplete verification
Database results are sufficient	Verification requires direct institutional engagement	False confidence in results
Digital records are consistently available	Record access varies by jurisdiction	Increased compliance & accuracy risk

02 Standardized Global Workflows

Each Asian market has distinct screening complexity that standardized workflows fail to address:

HK Hong Kong

Controlled criminal record access + strong data protection expectations

SG Singapore

Regulatory-driven verification + structured consent requirements

IN India

Variable institutional responsiveness + decentralized verification

JP Japan / Korea

Strict privacy frameworks + cultural sensitivity around candidate data

Execution & Compliance Gaps

03 Local Execution

Centralized ops without local expertise

→ Slower turnaround times

Dependence on intermediaries

→ Inconsistent verification quality

Limited local infrastructure

→ Reduced reliability & escalation handling

04 Compliance-First Design

Data Protection

PDPO, PDPA, PIPL, PIPA and local frameworks

Consent

Clear, informed, jurisdiction-aligned

Proportionality

Checks match role risk & legitimate need

Cross-Border Transfer

Data movement must be transparent & legal

Three More Critical Gaps

05 Fragmented Delivery

- › Different country teams create communication gaps
- › Disconnected workflows → inconsistent service quality
- › Multiple providers feel instead of one integrated solution

06 Cross-Border Blind Spots

- › Data transfer compliance across legal boundaries
- › Multi-jurisdiction coordination requires distinct capability
- › Regional HR needs comparable, standardized outputs

07 Speed Over Accuracy

- › Automation-driven models skip verification depth
- › Incomplete verification misses critical discrepancies
- › Reports become harder to defend in audits or disputes
